# What is PAW?

PAW (Professional & Academic Workshop) is a campus-wide consortium of student support organizations that offer workshops and speaker series for the benefit and improved success of graduate students. Although workshops are generally tailored to the needs of grad students, in most cases all students, faculty, and staff are welcome to attend. PAW was created through Graduate Studies to reduce redundancy of offerings, improve attendance and relevancy of the workshops offered, and to provide a current calendar to alert participants of upcoming events. The calendar also allows partners a chance to arrange scheduled workshops to avoid overlap with other offerings.

As with all our partners, Graduate Studies itself seeks to provide tools and support for graduate students throughout their academic journey— from their acceptance, to successful scholarship, to completion of their theses, dissertations and degrees, and onward to the workforce, whether it be in industry, business, or academia.

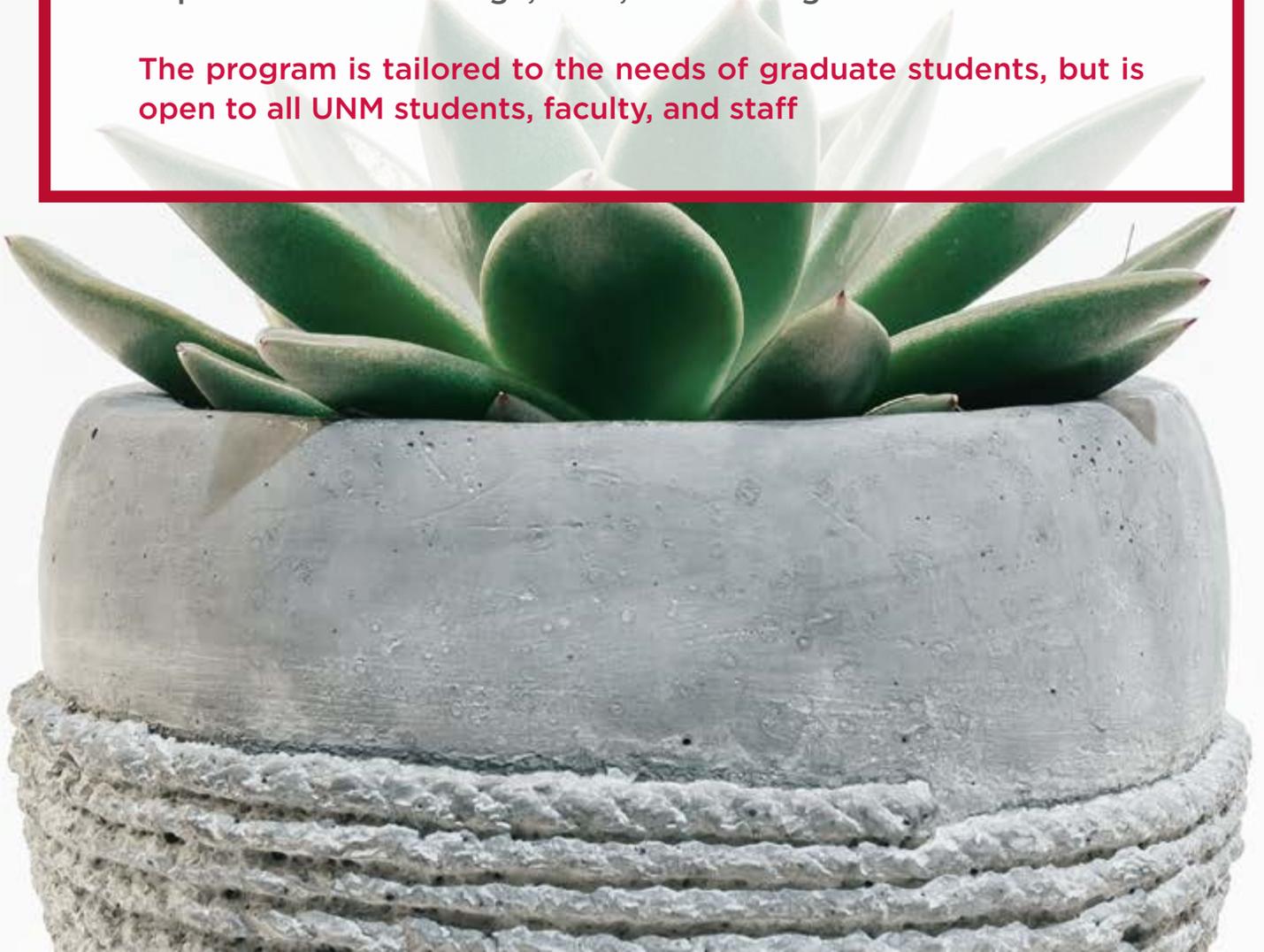

# Frequently Asked Questions

**Q: I noticed that some workshops are valid for multiple certificate tracks. Can I apply credit from one workshop to more than one certificate track?**

**A:** Attendance to a single workshop can be applied for credit on up to two certificate tracks, but each certificate track may include no more than three dual-use credits. This means that at least nine of the twelve credits for any given certificate are "single-use," meaning they have only been applied to that individual certificate.

**Q: I attended some workshops before the Certificate Program was put into place, but which are now listed as Designated Workshops within the program. Can I use that attendance for credit on a certificate?**

**A:** Absolutely! If you previously attended a workshop that now falls within a certificate track's designated curriculum, you can use it towards a certificate.

**Q: I attended an on-campus workshop that wasn't listed on the PAW website, but I think its topic applies to one of the certificate tracks. Can I use this attendance for credit for a certificate?**

**A:** There's a good chance you can! Submit a brief petition through the PAW website and a staff will review your request and inform you once a decision has been made.

**Q: Can I apply workshops taken at other universities to a PAW certificate?**

**A:** Possibly! Submit a Workshop Transfer Request through the PAW website and a staff member will review your request and inform you once a decision has been made.
